COVID-19 Safer Workplaces

The Scottish Government has today (26th May) issued a joint statement with Police Scotland, Health and Safety Executive and local authorities on safe workplaces which you can read in full here. In summary, the statement says:

- It is essential that physical distancing continues to be practiced along with other good hygiene practice such as regular and thorough hand washing and good respiratory etiquette. This applies equally to employees, customers and all those on business premises.
- It is essential that employers also carry out a COVID-19 risk assessment and these should be developed, where possible, alongside workplace health and safety representatives.
- Employers should continue to put in place measures to keep workers safe, including taking steps to help people work from home where they can do their job in this way, providing handwashing and hygiene procedures in line with guidance, and taking steps to maintain a minimum 2-metre distance between people in the workplace.
- The Scottish Government and the regulators will ensure that there is effective advice and guidance in place to support employers meet these obligations.

New Test and Protect Advice for Employers

In line with the new NHS Scotland *Test and Protect* programme, which goes live across Scotland from Thursday 28th (more details in today's statement from the First Minister here), the Scottish Government has today published new advice for employers on helping staff who need to self-isolate at home. No worker should be financially penalised by their employer for following medical advice to stay at home, and any absence from work relating to COVID-19 should not affect future sick pay

entitlement, result in disciplinary action or count towards any future sickness absence related action.

As part of *Test and Protect*, Scotland's approach to implementing the 'test, trace, isolate, support' strategy, the NHS will test people who have symptoms, trace people who may have become infected by spending time in close contact with someone who tests positive, and then support those close contacts to self-isolate. That means if they have the virus they are less likely to pass it on to others. Employers will play a vital role in ensuring that their employees are aware of and able to follow the public health guidance

What should employers do?

- Employers should follow <u>public health guidance</u> if an employee becomes unwell with coronavirus symptoms at work. The person should leave work to self-isolate straight away and, if possible, wear a face covering on route and avoid public transport. Direct your employees to <u>www.nhsinform.scot</u> or, if they can't get online, call 0800 028 2816, to arrange to get tested.
- Until they have been tested and told if it is safe to leave home, employers should make sure that staff do not have to, or feel that they have to, come in to work. Employees can request an isolation note through NHS Inform.
- People who have tested positive for the virus will need to self-isolate for a minimum of 7 days. NHS contact tracers will interview them and get in touch with people they have been in close contact with and tell them they must self-isolate for 14 days.
- If your employees are informed by a contact tracer that they should isolate, you should help them to do so straight away. They may feel well, as the virus could still be incubating when they are asked to isolate. Some people who are asked to isolate may not become unwell, but they must stay at home and self-isolate for the full 14 days. You can ask them to work from home if they are able to and they are not unwell.
- Give employees as much support as you can while they are away, including by protecting their income; checking in on them remotely and keep in touch as they self-isolate and asking them if they need help with picking up food, medicine or other essentials.
- Employers should not ask someone isolating to come into work before their period of isolation is complete, in any circumstances.

UK Government sets out a timeline for retail to reopen in June (England only)

The UK Government announced yesterday (25th May), a roadmap for reopening a broader range of shops starting from next week. From 1 June 2020, it intends to allow outdoor markets and car showrooms to reopen, subject to all premises being made COVID-secure. From 15 June 2020, UK Government intends to allow all other retailers to open, if the Government's five tests are met and they follow the COVID-19 secure guidelines.
